Plant Descriptions

Austrian Pine – Stiff, dark green needles 3½” to 6” long. Dense, pyramidal growth. Grows 75’ to 100’ tall. Likes full sun, ordinary to poor soil. Grows well in clay or sandy soil. Can take dry, rocky, windy conditions.

White Pine – Thin, flexible needles are light green and 4” long. Conical form when young, losing a defined shape with age. Grows 50’ to 100’ tall. Prefers moist, well-drained, slightly acidic soil, but will tolerate a wide range of growing conditions. Likes full sun. Fast growing.

Colorado Blue Spruce – Its silvery-blue to bluish-green needles are 1” long. Grows 75’ to 100’ tall. Likes ordinary soil, average moisture, full sun. Does not like wet soil. Very popular landscape tree.

Norway Spruce – Its dense, dark green needles never get longer than 1”. Will grow on most sites with average soil conditions. Grows 75’ to 100’ tall. It is one of the fastest growing of all the spruces. Horizontal branches produce ‘skirts’ hanging down as tree ages.

Douglas Fir – Needles 1” to 1½” long, blue-green to gray-green. Grows best in moist, well-drained soil with full sun. Grows to 60’ tall and spreads 15’ to 20’ wide. Does not tolerate extremely dry or wet sites.

Dawn Redwood – This is one of the few deciduous conifers, meaning it loses its needles every fall. The medium to bright green needles are ½’ long. Has a very uniform conical shape. Tree grows best on moist, well drained soil, and needs full sun. Rapid growth rate.

Basswood – Grows up to 70’ tall with spreading branches and fragrant white flowers. Broad heart-shaped leaves are dark green with silvery undersides. Fall color is green to yellow. Tree will grow in full sun to light shade, and prefers moist, fertile soils, but will tolerate difficult, dry, or heavy soils.

Ohio Buckeye – Grows from 30’ to 70’ tall with a broad, rounded crown. One of the first trees to leaf out in the spring and loses its leaves early in the fall. Prickly, light brown capsule opens to reveal the Buckeye seed. Bark is corky and warty when young and fissured when older. Tree does best in deep, moist, well-drained soil in full sun. Designated as Ohio’s State Tree.

Sweet Gum – This tree grows to 80’ tall with a straight trunk and pyramidal crown. Has very distinctive star-shaped leaves with 5 to 7 lobes, with green, yellow, orange, red, burgundy, and purplish fall color. Tree produces spiny “gumballs” 1” to 1½” in diameter that drop from the tree in the fall, but may persist into winter. Tree will grow in full to part sun, and likes moist, well drained soil.

Norway Maple – Grow up to 90’ tall with a dense, rounded crown, and grows rapidly when young. Flowers are showy in spring. Has dark green foliage, turning yellow in the fall. It is adaptable to many soil conditions and prefers full sun.

White Oak – Tree can grow 60’ to 80’ tall, becoming as wide as it is tall. Wide-spreading branching pattern with rounded crown when mature. Produces numerous acorns. Fall color develops late and is a long-lasting purple-red. This is one of the most attractive oak trees and is slow-growing. Grows best with full sun in acidic soil.

Tulip Poplar – Also called Tuliptree, Tulip Magnolia, and Yellow Poplar. Fast grower to 70’ to 90’ in height and 35 to 50’ in width. Large tulip-shaped flowers bloom in May and early June. Leaves also have the shape of a tulip, and turn a showy golden yellow in fall. Tree prefers deep, moist, fertile soil and full sun. This tree can become very large and requires ample space to develop.

Black Walnut – Large tree growing to 75’ tall with an oval-shaped, open crown. Large compound leaves are dark green, turning yellow and dropping early in the fall. Tree produces edible nut with semi-fleshy green covering that changes to black and breaks open. It prefers moist, well-drained deep soil and full sun.

Crabapple “Thunderchild” – Small tree growing 15’ to 20’ tall, with a rounded, dense habit. Flowers are deep pink-rose-red. Fruits are ½” in diameter, turning dark purplish-red and hang on the tree well after fall. Foliage is a deep purple-maroon color. Prefers full sun and moist, well-drained soils.

Eastern Redbud – Small tree 20’ to 30’ tall and spreading 25’ to 35’ wide, with dark-green heart-shaped leaves on zig-zag stems. Very showy-pink-purple flowers come on in late April-early May. Tree often divides into several branches near the ground, creating a broad spreading shape. Autumn foliage is yellow to yellow-green. Grows best in full sun to light shade, on moist well-drained soil.

Red Twig Dogwood – This multi-stemmed shrub grows to 10’ tall and 10’ wide with a round and spreading habit. Foliage is medium to dark green leaves up to 5” long, turning red in fall. Clusters of small white flowers produce white to pale-blue fruit. This shrub is known for its showy red stems that stand out in winter. It grows in many soil conditions where there is sufficient moisture. It does well in full to part sun. It spreads by way of stolons, which makes it great for soil stabilization.

Pachysandra – A dense, glossy evergreen ground cover reaching a height of 6” to 10”; does well in part to full shade. Will grow in a wide variety of soil conditions. Excellent for mass plantings on the North or East side of buildings and under shade trees.
